

Things to do in Rarotonga

1. ATTEND AN ISLAND NIGHT

Visiting the Cook Islands would not be complete without attending an 'Island Night' show. An energetic, colourful and entertaining show coupled with a buffet-style feast is what makes them so special.

2. LAGOON CRUISE

A fantastic day out exploring Rarotonga's beautiful lagoon by glass bottom boat. Enjoy snorkeling, fresh BBQ lunch, live entertainment, and an amazing coconut tree climbing show.

3. PUNANGA NUI MARKET

Where Avarua comes alive. Every Saturday morning, at this bustling market, you will get to chat with locals, sample local cuisine, sip organic coffee, shop for authentic souvenirs and enjoy free entertainment.

4. GO FOR A BUS RIDE

Riding the bus is super easy to do and you can't get lost. There are two buses that circle the island of Rarotonga; Clockwise and Anti-clockwise. The buses will stop anywhere along the main road. All you have to do is smile and wave them down.

5. SNORKELLING AT YOUR LEISURE

Stunning views continue below the crystal clear waters where marine life is abundant, colourful and diverse in the lagoon. The best snorkelling spots can be found on the western and southern sides of Rarotonga.

6. WATCH A SUNSET

The needle, hiking and beyond

Hiking to "The Needle" (Te Rua Manga) in Rarotonga is the most famous hike in the Cook Islands. As beautiful as it is spectacular, this half-day hike starts on the northern side of Rarotonga and takes you through the island jungle, up along the ridges to incredible views of the Pacific Ocean and Rarotonga. Choose to continue on the cross-island trek and you'll end up on the southern side of the island, where a dip in Papua Waterfall (Wigmores Waterfall) is a must.

Getting around is so easy!

With so much to offer, you'll be excited to learn that getting around our beautiful island is as easy as hopping on board a bus travelling in either a clockwise or anti-clockwise direction. Hire a rental car or jump on the back of a scooter and enjoy the wind on your face as you cruise around our island enjoying both beauty and adventure on tap. It takes just 45 minutes to drive around the whole island, so you'll never feel like you're stuck in the same spot.

Domestic air travel

Domestic flights are operated by Air Rarotonga with daily flights to Aitutaki and scheduled flights to Atiu, Mangaia, Mauke, Mitiaro, Manihiki, Tongareva and Pukapuka. For domestic flight schedule please visit www.airraro.com

Currency & banking

Currency in Rarotonga is the New Zealand dollar, supplemented by Cook Islands' notes and coins. ANZ, BSP, and BCI banks' are open from Monday to Friday, 9am to 3pm in downtown Avarua. Most hotels and stores offer EFTPOS. ATMs are conveniently located around Rarotonga, there is a Western Union office in Avarua that offers money exchange and transfers.

Electricity

Electricity voltage is 240 AC/50 cycle, the same three pin plugs as used in New Zealand and Australia. Some hotels have provisions for 110 volt AC electric razors.

Medical & dental

There is a well equipped hospital and dental clinics situated in Rarotonga. There are no poisonous animals or insects in Rarotonga.

Churches

Sunday is considered a day of rest and worship. There are several denominations on Rarotonga: Seventh Day Adventist,, Apostolic Church, Catholic Church, Cook Islands Christian Church, Latter Day Saints.

Weather

The Cook Islands enjoy a pleasant warm and sunny climate all year round. The drier months are from April to November with an average temperature of 26°C. November to March marks the warmer season, with slightly higher humidity and occasional rainfall between December and March when the temperature ranges between 22°C (min) and 30°C (max).

Driving

Driving is on the left-hand side of the road. Cars and motor scooters can be rented. International visitors (16 years and over) can drive in the Cook Islands for up to six months using their full overseas license. If a visitor wants to ride a scooter or motorbike in Rarotonga and is not licensed to do so at home, they will need to obtain a Cook Islands Drivers License at the Police Headquarters in Avarua. Helmets are compulsory.

Telecommunications

Traveller sim cards can be purchased from Vodafone (our telecommunications provider) and come pre loaded with calls, text and mobile data. Most smart phones will work with a local sim however check with your provider in your country before travelling to Rarotonga

Wifi

Internet on the island is readily available with over 150+ wifi hotspots (visit: www.vodafone.co.ck). Most accommodations offer wifi hotspots, and some offer internet in rooms that can be purchased.
